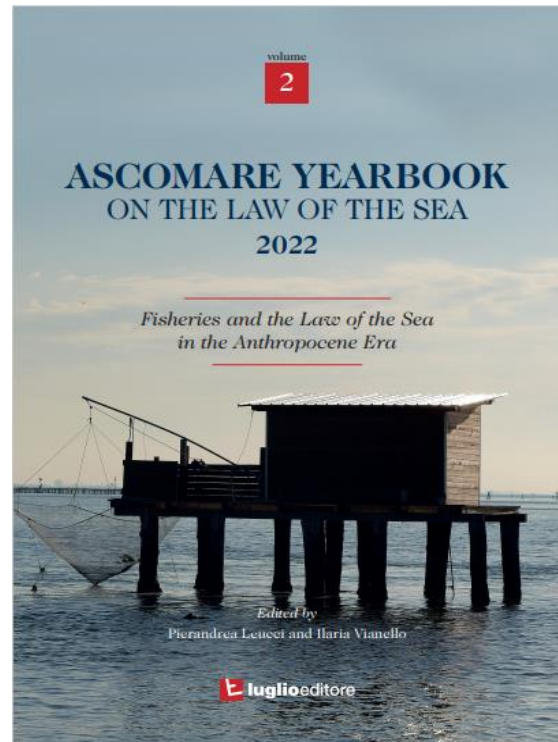
## Volume 2 – Fisheries and the Law of the Sea in the Anthropocene Era
